Patient Safety Program Putting Patient Safety First

What you must know to be JCAHO compliant!

- When identifying a patient, clinicians must use *two identifiers* (e.g. patient name and medical record number).
- When giving a medication, *match* the patient name and medical record number on a patient's wristband to the patient name and medical record number on the electronic *Medication Administration Record (MAR).*
- A nurse or pharmacist must enter the verbal order into the order entry system, or write the order on an order sheet on non-computer units, and then "read back" the order to the prescriber.
- Montefiore Medical Center's list of abbreviations not to use. The abbreviations on this list include: QN (Nightly), q6PM (Every evening at 6 PM), BT (Bedtime), U (Unit), IU (International Unit), Q.D. or qd (Latin abbreviation for once daily), Q.O.D or qod (Latin abbreviation for every other day), Trailing zero (X.0 prohibited only for medication-related notations), and MS, MSO4 or MgSO4 (Morphine Sulfate or Magnesium Sulfate) The list is located on the Montefiore intranet under Administrative Policy and Procedure JH8.1A for referencing.
- Vials of concentrated potassium (chloride, acetate, phosphate) and concentrated sodium chlorine (> 9%) are not considered floor stock in any MMC location
- All of MMC's intravenous infusion pumps must have free flow protection.
- Prior to the start of any operative/invasive procedure, the procedure site will be *marked* for invasive procedures involving right/left distinction, multiple structures (such as fingers and toes), or levels (as in spinal procedures). *Site marking* is not required for procedures in which the site of insertion/incision is not predetermined, or if the practitioner performing the procedure remains with the patient continuously from the time the consent is obtained to the time of the procedure itself.
- Immediately prior to the start of any surgical/invasive procedure, a final verification "Time Out," is conducted to confirm the correct patient, procedure and site.
- Montefiore has a system in place for internal reporting of medical errors. If a patient suffers
 harm from a medical error, it is required that an <u>occurrence report</u> be completed.
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- Patients, and when appropriate their families, are educated to their responsibilities related to patient safety, including: providing accurate and complete health information, asking questions when they do not understand what they have been told, and following instructions and treatment plans developed with the practitioner.
